Needless to say, this was a little disappointing for them because they wanted to publish fairly soon.

It's never easy hearing someone say your writing has problems but I think it's better to hear it before you publish. No one wants to get a poor review on Amazon or Goodreads because not only is it painful, but it's also out there for everyone to see. And we all know how mean some reviewers can be.

My pocket may not be bursting with money, but I never want to be "that person" who makes someone miserable by not delivering what they promised.
